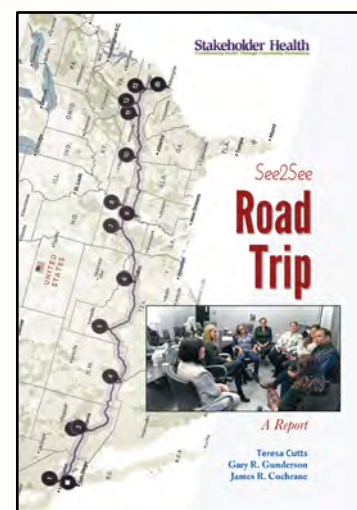

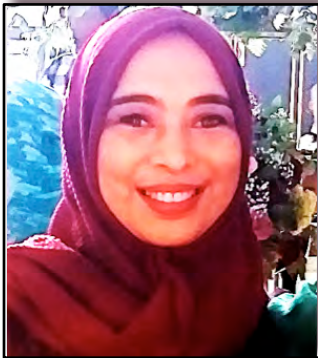
Arvind Singhal



Arvind (PhD) is Samuel Shirley and Edna Holt Marston Endowed Professor of Communication and Director of the Social Justice Initiative at The University of Texas at El Paso, the William J. Clinton Distinguished Fellow at the Clinton School of Public Service, Little Rock, Arkansas, and Distinguished Professor in the Faculty of Business Administration, Inland University of Applied Sciences, Norway. He teaches and conducts research on the diffusion of innovations, the positive deviance approach, organizing for social change, the entertainment-education strategy, and liberating interactional structures, covering fields as diverse as public health, education, human rights, poverty alleviation, sustainable development, civic participation, democracy and governance, and corporate citizenship. Co-author or editor of 14 books, three of which have won awards, he has also authored some 200 peer-reviewed essays, mainly in communication journals, several of them also

awarded. Multiply honoured in other ways too, in the USA, India, Japan, Slovakia, Germany, Arvind has served as an advisor to the World Bank, UN-FAO, UNICEF, UNDP, UNAIDS, UNFPA, U.S. Department of State; U.S. A.I.D., Family Health International, PATH, Save the Children, the BBC World Service Trust, International Rice Research Institute, Voice for Humanity, and several private corporations, and has visited and lectured in some 90 countries of Asia, Africa, Latin America, Australia, Europe, and North America.
